PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Capital's political science major provides you with the skills necessary to interpret and analyze current political events - skills that are essential to becoming a well-educated citizen of the contemporary world. Our program's faculty is committed to the philosophy that valuable education can take place outside of a traditional classroom setting. As a political science major, you will engage in activities that bring you into contact with the world of politics. This major will allow you to develop critical thinking and analytical skills. Supplemental courses can be taken alongside the major requirements to become licensed in Ohio to teach grades 7-12.

CAREERS AND PLACEMENT

The political science major offers a program of study that leads to careers in government at the city, state, or federal level, or in the foreign service. It also opens career paths in local, national, and international organizations, the legal profession, lobbying, secondary or university teaching, as well as the opportunity to continue your education in graduate or law school. EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Students can earn credit as interns while working in a city, state, or local government office, with a non-governmental organization, or the federal government. As interns, students work with politicians, government officials, professional specialists, lobbyists, and more. Recent internships held include local organizations such as the Ohio Department of Transportation, Franklin County Clerk of Courts, Ohio Statehouse Upper Level Page Program, and others.
