HISTORY OF BLACK GREEK ORGANIZATIONS

The creation of the Divine Nine

In the early 20th century, many African American students who attended universities were often banned from joining organizations on campus and had little to no opportunity to bond and form connections with other students experiencing the same things. For this reason, Alpha Phi Alpha was formed. Initially as a study and support group, the organization expanded and eventually influenced the creation of other organizations. The first nine organizations became known as the Divine Nine and each have been uplifting, supporting, and fighting for Black communities nationally and globally.

Below are the founding years and colleges of the Divine Nine:


The Hivine Nine

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. is an organization of college educated women committed to the constructive development of its members and to public service with a primary focus on the Black community.




