# **PSYCHOLOGY**

#### PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The psychology department at Capital strives to make you distinctive. To help ensure you have diverse experiences, you will take classes where you'll experience the major areas in psychology as well as engage in high impact practices, such as community-engaged learning, undergraduate research, and internships. We have designed this major so that students can explore other interests through a second major, minor, or an emphasis in another discipline. All of our psychology students work with a faculty mentor to design a program of study that helps them achieve their career and personal goals. Capital's location in Columbus, Ohio gives students the opportunity to use what they learn in the classroom and apply it in real life settings, such as hospitals, clinics, schools, and community organizations.

#### CAREERS AND PLACEMENT

The psychology major provides a pre-professional foundation for careers and graduate study. Approximately 40% of Capital's psychology graduates go on to study and earn advanced degrees in psychology, law, medicine, and other disciplines. All psychology students take a junior-level career development class where they learn to tell their story to prospective internship supervisors, employers, and graduate and professional programs.

#### EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Capital embraces high-impact practices — undergraduate research, internships, capstone projects and other teaching approaches proven to optimize student learning. Here, you will delve into research — surveying the broad knowledge built by scholars before you and contribute your own research to the body of knowledge, under the guidance of your professors.

Capital's location in the capital city of Columbus will give you the opportunity to apply what you learn in the classroom to real life settings through internships, community engagement projects, undergraduate research and studying abroad. Students have completed internships at Franklin County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Maryhaven, Behavioral Science Specialists (for forensic psychology), Nationwide Children's Hospital, and Twin Valley Behavioral Health.
