INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

This major provides students with the skills to be effective workers and citizens in today's globalized world. Students will gain skill-based learning and experience that prepares students to pursue careers with international non-governmental agencies, international organizations, social service agencies, or to further study in graduate or law school. Students are expected to develop a functional usage of a second language. Capital currently offers courses in Spanish French, German ,and Russian. Through the Higher Education Council of Columbus, students can also take Russian, Mandarin, Korean, Japanese, Italian, Arabic, and more at other nearby colleges.

CAREERS AND PLACEMENT

Many of our students go on to law school or graduate school, including Notre Dame, University of Cape Town (South Africa), Schiller College (England), The Ohio State University, The American University of Cairo (Egypt), Capital University Law School, and others. Many of our recent graduates now hold jobs at organizations such as the American Red Cross, U.S. Department of Citizenship and Immigration Services, Mitsubishi International, Kyushu Lutheran College (Japan), Habitat for Humanity International Aid to Artisans, UNESCO, Women for Women International, CARE, the United States Army, and many more.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Capital has affiliations with domestic and international organizations, providing students with many internship opportunities. Semester and year-long study abroad programs are also available. Students have studied in Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, England, Ghana, Greece, Mexico, Russia, Sweden, Thailand, and more. Faculty also lead students on short-term trips in various countries.

STUDY ABROAD

Study abroad for this program typically occurs during either fall or spring of the third year, or fall of the fourth year of study. There are a variety of courses available for the study abroad experience.
